

Manual Software SPECTRO3-MSM-DOCAL-Scope V1.4

(PC software for Microsoft® Windows® 7, 8, 10)

for color sensors of SPECTRO-3-MSM Series

This manual describes the installation of the PC software SPECTRO3-MSM-DOCAL-Scope.

The software was developed for calibrating color sensors of the

SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG Series SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA Series SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE Series and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLA Series

Here, calibration takes place with a calibration wizard, which guides the user step by step through the calibration process via the corresponding instruction windows.

The calibration can optionally be done with RAL plates whose L*a*b* values are available in a file. During the calibration you will be asked to load this file. Then a RAL plate is placed in front of the sensor. The corresponding L*a*b* values are then loaded from the file by entering the corresponding serial number. There are 3 preconditions

- 1. You need one reference plate. This is one of the RAL 9003-P, RAL 9010-P or RAL 9016-P plates.
- 2. You need different RAL color plates from the RAL CLASSIC or RAL DESIGN SYSTEM plus series. They are available from the supplier of the sensor.
- 3. You need a file (.ini file) in which the L*a*b* values for the various RAL plates are stored. This file is also available from the supplier (via download → RAL Plate Data Files).

Another method is to enter the L*a*b* values manually. In this case you also need a reference surface and different surfaces from which the L*a*b* values are known. As a reference surface we recommend one of the RAL plates RAL 9003-P, RAL 9010-P or RAL 9016-P.

If the calibration values are saved to a file after successful calibration, they can be loaded as a calibration template for the next calibration, expanded, or sent directly to the sensor.

After successful calibration, the sensor can be taught different surfaces (colors).

The parameters required for this are enabled on the PC interface. Other parameters, which can only be set via the respective main software, or which were permanently set during calibration, are only displayed in gray and cannot be changed.

As usual, the sensor data are visualized on the PC surface. The current color space coordinates (mostly L* a* b*) as well as their difference (delta L*, delta a*, delta b*) to a respective color hit are also displayed.

The color space coordinates as well as their deltas and two freely adjustable documentation entries can then be output to a label printer, for example.

1. Installation of the SPECTRO3-MSM-DOCAL-Scope software

The following requirements must be fulfilled for successful installation of the software:

- Microsoft® Windows® 7, 8, 10
- IBM PC AT or compatible
- VGA graphics
- · Microsoft-compatible mouse
- Serial RS232 interface at the PC or USB slot or RJ45 connector
- Cable cab-las4/PC for the RS232 interface or cab-4/USB USB converter or cab-4/ETH Ethernet converter

Please install the software as described below:

- You can download the software via a provided download link or, if applicable, install it via the provided software DVD. To install the software, start the 'SETUP' program in the 'SOFTWARE' folder.
- The installation program displays a dialog and suggests to install the software in the C:\"FILENAME" directory on the hard disk.
 You may accept this suggestion with OK or [ENTER], or you may change the path as desired. Installation is then performed automatically.
- 3. During the installation process a new program group for the software is created in the Windows Program Manager. In the program group an icon for starting the software is created automatically. When installation is successfully completed the installation program displays "Setup OK".
- After successful installation the software can be started with a left mouse button double-click on the icon.




2. Operation of the SPECTRO3-MSM-DOCAL-Scope software

Please read this chapter first before you start calibration.

When the SPECTRO3-MSM-DOCAL-Scope software is started, the following window appears on the Windows interface:

In this case a sensor of the SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA series is connected. For other sensors the view changes depending on the available parameters and functions.



The window size and position will be the same as when the software was last closed. A double-click with the right mouse button, e.g. under the minimise symbol places the window centrally in its original size.

If a connection is not established automatically, e.g. if no sensor is connected, the software can be run in OFFLINE mode. In offline mode it only is possible to exchange parameters with a file on a storage medium, which often is helpful for the purpose of analysing parameter files.

If a sensor is connected and a connection still cannot be established, either the SCOPE version (program at the PC) and the firmware version (program in the sensor) do not match, or the interface to the sensor must be correctly configured.

If different Scope and firmware versions should be the problem, please get the Scope version that matches the firmware from your supplier.


The interface configuration is described in the CONNECT tab chapter.

Pressing the right mouse button on an individual element will call up a short help text.

Due to a better overview, parameters that are not required, displays, graphs, etc., are greyed out or invisible depending on the parameterization.



2.1 Tab CONNECT



CONNECT:

Pressing the **CONNECT** tab opens a window for selecting and configuring the interface.

The **COMMUNICATION PROTOCOL** function field is used for selecting either an **RS232** or a **TCP/IP** protocol.

If RS232 is selected, a port from 1 to 256 can be selected with SELECT COM PORT, depending on which port the sensor is connected to. The sensor operates with a set baudrate that can be modified with CHANGE BAUDRATE (see below). The sensor and the user interface both must operate with the same baudrate.

At the user interface the baudrate is set with **SELECT BAUDRATE**. If after starting the software should not automatically establish a connection, the correct baudrate can be found with **SELECT BAUDRATE**.

If an converter is used, the **COM PORT** number can be determined by way of the hardware manager in the system control panel.

A click on the magnifier symbol opens a list with all the possible COM ports in the display.

An RS232 to Ethernet converter **(cab-4/ETH)** is needed if the sensor should communicate through a local network. With this converter a connection to the sensor can be established using the **TCP/IP** protocol.

Parameterisation of the **cab-4/ETH** converter (assigning of IP address, baudrate setting, ...) can be done with the **SensorFinder software** that is available free of charge on the internet.

In order to establish a connection to the converter, its IP address or HOST name must be entered in the field IP ADDRESS (xxx.xxx.xxx.) OR HOST NAME. The DROP DOWN menu (down arrow) shows the last 10 IP addresses that were used. An address from this list can be directly selected by clicking on the respective item. The DROP DOWN list is saved and is thus always available when the software is closed.

The PORT NUMBER for the cab-4/ETH is 5000. This port number must not be changed.

When you press the **TRY TO CONNECT** button, the software tries to establish a connection with the set parameters. The communication status is shown in the display field. If the sensor answers with its FIRMWARE ID, the set connection type can be accepted by pressing **ACCEPT SETTINGS**. You will then be returned to the **PARA** tab. If you get a **TIMEOUT** message, the software could not establish a connection to the sensor. In this case please check if the interface cable is correctly connected, if the sensor is supplied with power, and if the set parameters are correct.

If a connection has been accepted by pressing **ACCEPT SETTINGS**, the software starts automatically with these settings when called the next time.

DISCONNECT disconnects the connection between sensor and PC. The software then switches to OFFLINE mode, where it is only possible to exchange parameters with a file on a storage medium.

Under **PANEL ID** a name can be entered that will be displayed at different points in the program window, and that will be recorded in different files (e.g. Record File) as well. With the input field **LANGUAGE** a language can be set with which the individual controls are displayed on the surface. This also applies to the help function that is actuated with the right mouse button.

Please note:


The stable function of the interface is a basic prerequisite for measured value transfer from the PC to the sensor.



Due to the limited data transfer rate through the serial RS232 interface only slow changes of the raw signals at the sensor front end can be observed in the graphic output window of the PC.

For maintaining maximum switching frequency at the sensor data communication with the PC must be stopped (press the STOP button).





The baudrate for data transfer through the RS232 interface can be set by means of the **SELECT BAUDRATE** drop down menu and **CHANGE BAUDRATE** function field.


If the baudrate should be changed, a connection must first be established by clicking on **TRY TO CONNECT**.

The **CHANGE BAUDRATE** button will then be active.



Now a new baudrate can be selected under **SELECT BAUDRATE**.

A click on **CHANGE BAUDRATE** sends the new baudrate information to the sensor.



When the new baudrate information has been successfully sent, the sensor operates with the new baudrate. A window will pop up, prompting you to select **EEPROM** and then to press **SEND**. After a hardware reset the new baudrate only will be used when **EEPROM** and **SEND** have been pressed.


A click on **ACCEPT SETTINGS** saves the current interface settings, which will then be automatically set when the software is restarted.




A click on the **GEN. HW INFO FILE** generates a file in which all the important sensor data are stored in encrypted form. This file can be sent to the manufacturer for diagnostic purposes.



2.2 Tab PARA1, PARA2, button SEND, GET, GO, STOP





PARA1 and PARA2:

ATTENTION:

The PARA2 tab appears only when using SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE series sensors.

It does not appear for **SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA** and **SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLA** series sensors.

Upon clicking **PARA1** or **PARA2**, there opens a view in which the sensor parameters are displayed.

Only the parameters that are needed for the respective SPECTRO-3-MSM series are visible.

Some parameters are active and can be changed if, for example, colors are taught after calibration. Others are grayed out and cannot be changed because they were preset during calibration, for example.

The meanings of the parameters are explained in the manual of the respective connected sensor.

A right-click on an active parameter (i.e. not grayed out) opens a window with brief information.

SEND [F9]:

By clicking the SEND button (or by shortcut key F9) all currently set parameters are transferred between PC and the sensor. The target of the respective parameter transfer is determined by the selected radio button (RAM, EEPROM or FILE).

GET [F10]:

The currently set values can be interrogated from the sensor by clicking on the **GET** button (or with shortcut key button F10). The source of data exchange is determined by the selected button (**RAM**, **EEPROM**, or **FILE**).

RAM:

The current parameters are read from the **RAM** of the sensor on pressing **GET**.

EEPROM:

The current parameters are read from its **EEPROM** upon pressing **GET**.

FILE:

After pressing **SEND**, the current parameters can be written to a selectable file on the hard disk. With **GET** parameters can be read from such a file. When the **SEND** or **GET** button is pressed, a dialog box opens for selecting the desired file.

GO [F11]:

Upon clicking this button, the data transfer from the sensor to the PC is started. The data are displayed in the display elements on the PC interface.

STOP [F12]:

Clicking this button ends the data transfer from the sensor to the PC.





AVERAGE:

This function field is used for adjusting the number of scanning values (measurement values) over which the raw signal measured at the receiver is averaged. A higher **AVERAGE** default value reduces noise of the raw signals at the receiver unit and there will be a decrease of the maximal available switching frequency of the sensor.



DIGITAL OUTMODE:

ATTENTION:

The DIGITAL OUTMODE parameter appears only for sensors of SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG, SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE and SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA series.

It does not appear for sensors of the SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLA series.

This group of buttons offers the method of how to control the digital outputs.

OFF:

No digital signal is output. All the corresponding function fields are hidden.

DIRECT:

In this mode, a maximum of 5 teach colors or COLOR GROUPS can be taught for SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE sensors.

For SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA sensors 2 colors can be taught. There are no COLOR GROUPS.

If in this row-by-row comparison the current color values correspond with the teach-in parameters entered in the teach table, this "hit" in the teach table is displayed as a color number (C-No.) and is sent **direct** to the digital outputs.

DIRECT HI:

If **DIRECT HI** is activated, the respective digital output is set to HIGH. If no color was detected, all digital outputs are set to LOW.

DIRECT LO:

If **DIRECT LO** is activated, the specially digital output is set to LOW, while the other ones are set to HIGH. If no color was detected, all digital outputs are set to HIGH.

BINARY HI

If in the row-by-row comparison the current color values correspond with the teach-parameters entered in the color table, this "hit" in the color table is displayed as a color number (C-No.) and is provided at the digital outputs as a **bit pattern**.

In this mode a maximum of 31 teach colors or color groups can be taught with SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE sensors.

For SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA sensors 3 colors can be taught. There are no COLOR GROUPS.

BINARY LO:

Same function as BINARY HI, but the bit pattern is output inversely.





ANALOG OUTMODE:

ATTENTION:

The ANALOG OUTMODE parameter appears only for sensors of SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLA series.

It does not appear for sensors of SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE series.

This function field is used to determine the signals that the sensor provides at its analog outputs.

OFF: No analog signal is output.

XYZ:

The tristimulus values X, Y, Z are acquired with 12 bit resolution.

The signals therefore may have values between 0 and 4095.

At the respective analog outputs these values are provided in a 0...+10V or 4...20mA range.

COLOR SPACE:

The color coordinates of the selected **C SPACE** are scaled to 12 bit and are output as a voltage from 0 to 10 V at the respective analog outputs.

Depending on the color coordinate, the analog output range is divided as follows:

x y Y from 0 to +1 (0V=0, 10V=1)
L* from 0 to +100 (0V=0, 10V=100)
a* from -150 to +150 (0V=-150, 10V=150)
u* from -788 to +724 (0V=-788, 10V=724)
u' from 0 to +4 (0V=0, 10V=4)
C* from 0 to +538 (0V=0, 10V=538)

b* from -150 to +150 (0V=-150, 10V=150)
v* from -154 to +164 (0V=-154, 10V=164)
v' from 0 to +0,6 (0V=-0, 10V=0,6)
h* from 0 to 360 (0V=0, 10V=360)
```

CS REF:

When input IN0 is set to HI, the current C SPACE color coordinates are saved as 5 V reference values.

This means that when the respective current **C SPACE** color value is equal to the reference value, 5 V will be output at the corresponding analog output. If the current value deviates from the reference value, this deviation is output at the corresponding analog output starting from 5 V and amplified by the **ZOOM** factor.

Example: ZOOM = x4, \mathbf{a}^* (reference) = 60, \mathbf{a}^* (current) = 70 \rightarrow deviation = 10 (1 digit is approx. 2.44mV) Output: 5 V+(10 digit * 32 (zoom) * 2.44 mV) = approx. 5.78 V.

The reference values are displayed in the graph window under the **C SPACE** tab.


Since the sensor only has one hardware input (IN0) this input possibility is not always available. If, for example, you select **ANA OUT = IN0 L→H**, the input already is used for a controlled output of the analog signal and is no longer available for **CS REF**.

Function fields that are not available will either be hidden or deactivated.

ANA OUT SIGNAL:

Here you set whether the analog signal should be output as voltage (0 ... 10V) or current (4 ... 20mA).







PARA2:

ATTENTION:

The PARA2 tab appears only for sensors of SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE series.

It does not appear for sensors of **SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA** and **SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLA** series.

A click on **PARA2** opens a view where colors in the **TEACH TABLE** can be assigned to certain groups, and for each color and the error status an explicit **HOLD** time can be set.

Please note:

The sensor must be informed about the color groups and HOLD settings by pressing SEND.

COLOR GROUPS:

By means of the GROUP table individual rows can be assigned to a group.

In this example, **COLOR GROUPS** has been set to **ON**, i.e. group evaluation is activated.

Rows 0 and 1 have been assigned to group 0.

Rows 2 and 3 have been assigned to group 1, and row 4 to group 2.

A GRP display is shown under the C-No: display.

If, as in this example, row 3 is detected in the evaluation, this row and the corresponding group will be visualised.

The group number will be output through the outputs.

A total number of 48 different colors can be taught.

In evaluation mode **DIRECT HI** and **DIRECT LO** a maximum of 5 groups can be formed (group 0 to 4).

In evaluation mode **BINARY HI** and **BINARY LO** 31 groups can be formed.

All the cell values can be set to 0 by pressing **RESET**.

A double-click on the **GRP** display opens a larger display window.

HOLD in milliseconds [ms]:

The sensor operates with minimum scanning times in the magnitude of less than 100µs. This is why most of the PLCs that are connected to the digital outputs have difficulties with the safe detection of the resulting short switching state changes. Entering values in the table provides pulse lengthening at the digital outputs of the sensor system up to 100 ms. Each individual row can be assigned its own HOLD time.

When the **RESET** button is pressed, the complete table is set to the reset value indicated beside the **RESET** button.

Example:

Print marks are transported at a very high speed. The print marks are positioned in the sensor's range only for a very short time (milliseconds or even shorter). A minimum pulse of 10 ms is required for the reliable detection of a mark.

The background is taught to row 0, and the print mark to row 1. This is desirable because it allows the use of the **BEST HIT** evaluation mode.


If row 0 and row 1 overlap seamlessly, the sensor operates perfectly. The output is immediately activated and remains active at least for the time specified in the corresponding row.

If row 0 and row 1 do not overlap, the sensor detects an error at the transition from row 0 to row 1 (print mark), which immediately is sent to the output and remains active there at least for the **HOLD** time. An error inevitably would occur here if **HOLD** for the error state (255) was chosen too high, because the sensor only outputs a status change again after **HOLD** has elapsed (this may be the print mark, but it does not have to be).

It is absolutely necessary here to select a **HOLD** time of 0 for error state 255.



2.3 Tab TEACH (teach table)



TEACH:

ATTENTION:

The **TEACH** tab appears only for sensors of **SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG**, **SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE**, and **SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA** series.

It does not appear for sensors of SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLA series.

Clicking **TEACH** opens a view in which the **TEACH TABLE** and some parameters required for operation of the digital outputs are displayed.

Some parameters are active and can be changed, e.g. if colors are taught after calibration. Others are grayed out and cannot be changed because they were preset during calibration, for example.

The meanings of the parameters are explained in the manual of the respective connected sensor.

A right-click on an active parameter (i.e. not grayed out) opens a window with brief information.

The **TEACH TABLE** is organised in rows, i.e. the individual parameters for the teach colors are listed side by side in the respective row.

The sensor can work with up to 48 teach colors, depending on the sensor type. The number of the respective teach color is shown in the left column of the table.

Only rows with a green number are used for evaluation by the sensor. The number of rows to be used is defined with **MAXCOL-No.**



After pressing **TEACH DATA TO**, the currently displayed color coordinates and the brightness value are transferred to the line of the **TEACH TABLE** selected under **No.:**. In addition, a color


tolerance (**delta E**) is set. The tolerances, as well as the teach values, can be changed if necessary by doubleclicking the respective field with the left mouse button (or by pressing F2) by entering numerical values with the PC keyboard.

If Inc is activated and the TEACH DATA TO button is pressed, an automatic incrementation (increase) of the input field No.: by 1 is performed, i.e. the next line in the TEACH TABLE is selected.

Pressing the **RESET** button resets the **TEACH TABLE** (RESET value = 0).







With TEACH REFERENCE FROM FILE TO ROW 0 a "teach color" can be taught from a file into row 0 of the teach table. As soon as you have pressed the button, you will be asked to enter the serial number of the color to be taught. After entering the serial number, you will be asked to select the corresponding "Teach Reference File.ini". If the reference (teach color) is found in the selected file, it is entered in the teach table and shown in the display below the button.

The file with the different teach colors (reference values) must be created by the user beforehand.

It must be structured exactly as described here.

ATTENTION! Some special characters may not be displayed correctly. This varies from country to country. It is therefore recommended to avoid using special characters.

To do this, start the Microsoft Editor, for example, and enter the following text in the first two lines:

[GENERAL INFO]

FILE TYPE: = "TEACH REFERENCE FILE"

Then enter different reference values (teach colors) exactly as described here.

In the square brackets is the serial number of the teach color. [xxxxxx]

A name for the teach color is entered between the quotation marks.

PLATE NAME = "name"

This is followed by the L* a* b* values. These must be entered with a point (not a comma) as separator.

 $L^* = 56.41$

 $a^* = -7.54$

 $b^* = -19.5$

Any number of teach colors can be entered in the file.

When all the teach colors have been entered, select under **File "Save as..."** a suitable **name** for the file with the extension .ini and save it, e.g. **Teach Reference File Granules XY.ini**

The file can be opened with the editor at any time in order to change or extend it.



MAXCOL-No.:

This function field serves for setting the number of colors to be checked.

ATTENTION:

The **DIGITAL OUTMODE** tab appears only for sensors of **SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG**, **SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE** and **SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA** series.

It does not appear for sensors of **SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLA** series.

With OUTMODE = DIRECT HI or DIRECT LO a maximum of 5 colors or color groups can be taught for SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE sensors.

For SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA sensors 2 colors can be taught. There are no COLOR GROUPS.

With **OUTMODE = BINARY HI** or **BINARY LO** a maximum of 31 colors or color groups can be taught for **SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG** and **SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE** sensors.

For SPECTRO-3-MSM-ANA sensors 3 colors can be taught. There are no COLOR GROUPS.

If COLOR GROUPS = ON (for SPECTRO-3-MSM-DIG and SPECTRO-3-MSM-SLE sensors), the sensor can be taught up to 48 colors.

However, only 31 groups can be formed with OUTMODE = BINARY and 5 groups with DIRECT HI or LO.


The numerical value that is set here determines the current possible scan rate of the color sensor. If the number of colors to be checked is lower, the sensor operates faster. The numerical value that is defined here refers to the number of rows (starting with row 0) in the **TEACH TABLE** (\rightarrow TEACH tab).






SHAPE MODE:

This function field is used to specify whether the color space coordinates (e.g. L* a* b*) should be viewed as a block, cylinder, or sphere in space.



The color distance **delta E** is calculated from the color coordinates (a* b*).


A color is recognised if the current color space coordinates lie in the color block.



When viewed as a cylinder, the color coordinates (a* b*) have their own tolerance (a*b*Tol), and the brightness value (L*) has its own tolerance (L*Tol).

The color distance **delta E** is calculated from the color coordinates (a^*b^*) .


A color is recognised if the current color space coordinates lie in the color cylinder.



In sphere mode there only is one tolerance for the color space coordinates.

The color distance **delta E** is calculated from the color space coordinates $(L^* a^* b^*)$.

A color is recognised if the current color space coordinates lie in the color sphere.






2.4 Graphical display elements

Tab XYZ:

Display of the current raw signals (tristimulus values) X, Y, Z of the 3-fold receiver.

The LED SAT indicates if one of the channels is in saturation. In this case, it lights up red.



A double click with the left mouse button in the XYZ graph starts an automatic zoom function. A single click terminates this function.

Tab C SPACE:


Color coordinates of the color space selected under C SPACE are shown in the displays.


In **GO** mode, the deltas **dL***, **da***, **db*** are calculated from the color hit detected in the sensor and the current color space coordinates. (Left graphic)

If the **DOCU** tab is selected and the recording of data via **CAPTURE DATA FRAME** is activated, the deltas are always calculated from the currently applied color space coordinates and the teach vector in row 0 in the teach table.

If the deltas exceed the taught tolerance, the displays for the color space coordinates will be colored orange and the displays for the deltas will be colored according to their color shift. (Right graphic)

Example: The teach value for L^* in the table is **91** and the tolerance is **2**. The current value of L^* is **93.46**. It is therefore **2.46** greater than the teach value of **91** and has exceeded the tolerance of **2**. This in turn means that the current surface is brighter than the taught one. In this case, the display dL^* is shown white. If the L^* value of the current surface were smaller than the taught-in value of **91** minus **2** tolerance (**89**), then the current surface would be darker and the display dL^* would be colored black.








Tab C SPACE 3D:

Three-side view of the taught color in space.

The taught <u>color space coordinates</u> with their tolerances and the current color position are displayed. A three-side view in space was chosen to provide a clearer representation.



A left double-click in one of the graphs causes all the circles to be displayed in grey, only the circle with the recognised color is displayed in color.

A single left click returns to the standard view.

A left double-click in the XYZ graph starts an automatic zoom function.

A single left click closes this zoom function again

The graph with the color chart in the background can be zoomed in and out.

Use the green arrow keys in the upper left corner of the a*/b* graph to zoom in or out.




Tab **DOCU**:

If the DOCU tab is selected and the recording of data via **CAPTURE DATA FRAME** is activated, the deltas are always calculated from the currently applied color space coordinates and the learning vector in line 0 in the teach value table and shown in the individual displays.

If the deltas exceed the taught tolerance, then the corresponding graphs are highlighted in orange.

With the grey arrow keys to the left of the graphs you can scale the Y-axis of the graph. Use the **RESET** button to set the graph to 0.

Use the green arrow keys in the upper left corner to drag and drop this view over the entire panel.







These numerical value displays show the color coordinates and brightness values that are calculated from the tristimulus values X, Y, Z.

Calculation is performed as described in C SPACE.



These numeric value displays show the deviations of the individual color coordinates and of the brightness value of the current surface from the "color hit" (C-No:) in the **TEACH TABLE**.

The values are calculated on the PC user interface and not in the sensor, and are only shown in these displays.



delta E:

The color deviation from the color hit is shown in this display.



C-No:

The currently detected color number according to the entry in the **TEACH TABLE** is displayed in this numeric output field. The current detected color number is applied to the digital outputs as the corresponding bit pattern.

A value of 255 means that none of the colors that have been learned has been detected.



GRP:

If there is a sensor connected, with which it is possible to form color groups, the detected color group is shown in this display.

The currently detected group **GRP** and not **C-No:** is applied at the digital outputs as the corresponding bit pattern.

A value of 255 means that none of the groups or colors that have been learned has been detected.



INO:

This LED display visualises the status of input INO.

If 0 V is applied at the input, the LED is black.

If 24 V is applied at the input, the LED is green.

This display only is visible if the input is used.



TEMP:

This display shows the temperature in the sensor housing.

The display does NOT show degrees Celsius or Fahrenheit.



DP SET:

With which DOUBLE PARAMETER SET the sensor is working currently is shown in this display.

Please note: The above-mentioned output fields are only updated when data transfer between PC and sensor is active (GO button pressed).




2.5 Tab CALIB

The sensors are factory calibrated. If the **CALIB** parameter is set to **FCAL** (Factory **CAL**ibration), the sensor operates with this factory calibration.

As an alternative the user can himself calibrate the sensor to different surfaces (User CALibration). If CALIB=UCAL is selected, the sensor operates with the calibration made by the user.

A click on CALIB will open the following window:



With START CALIBRATION ASSISTANT you can start an assistant that guides you through the calibration.

The calibration can optionally be done with RAL plates whose $L^*a^*b^*$ values are available in a file. During the calibration you will be asked to load this file. Then a RAL plate is placed in front of the sensor. The corresponding $L^*a^*b^*$ values are then loaded from the file by entering the corresponding serial number. There are 3 preconditions

- 1. You need **one** reference plate. This is one of the RAL 9003-P, RAL 9010-P or RAL 9016-P plates.
- You need different RAL color plates from the RAL CLASSIC or RAL DESIGN SYSTEM plus series. They are available from the supplier of the sensor.
- 3. You need a file (.ini file) in which the L*a*b* values for the various RAL plates are stored. This file is also available from the supplier (via download → RAL Plate Data Files).

Another method is to enter the L*a*b* values manually. In this case you also need a reference surface and different surfaces from which the L*a*b* values are known. As a reference surface we recommend one of the RAL plates RAL 9003-P, RAL 9010-P or RAL 9016-P.

ATTENTION! It may happen that the Xn, Yn, Zn values cannot be determined due to an unsuitable choice of reference surface. In this case, try another reference surface or one of the recommended RAL plates.

If the calibration values are saved to a file after successful calibration, they can be loaded as a calibration template for the next calibration, expanded, or sent directly to the sensor.

Upon pressing **GET CF**, the calibration factors that have been determined are displayed in the tab **SENSOR DATA**.

The individual tables, displays and display boxes for calculating the calibration factors are updated automatically during the calibration process. They cannot be changed and need not be paid any further attention.



2.6 Tab DOCU

Clicking **DOCU** opens a view in which, after pressing **CAPTURE DATA FRAME**, a recording of the color space coordinates starts depending on the setting in CAPTURE DATA MODE.


If **CAPTURE DATA MODE = MANUAL**, a single frame is picked and displayed.

In case of **CAPTURE DATA MODE = PERIOD**, color space coordinates are sampled via a **PERIOD LENGTH [s]** long time, summed up and then averaged and displayed.

With CAPTURE DATA MODE = WHILE INO IS HIGH, color space coordinates frames are recorded and summed up as long as the input INO is set. After INO drops, the average values are formed and displayed.

ATTENTION! This mode only operates if one of the trigger modes is activated in the sensor.

The delta values of the individual color space coordinates are calculated from the recorded color space coordinates and the teach vector in line 0 in the teach table and displayed in the individual displays. If the deltas leave the taught tolerance, the corresponding graphs are highlighted in red.



With the button **SELECT RECORD FILE** you select a file in which the **X, Y, Z** values, the color coordinates, the respective **delta** values as well as the color hit (**C-No:**) and the sensor temperature can be stored. If the checkbox ADD PRINTOUT LIN1 TO RECORDER FILE (COMMENT) is selected, additionally the content of

The file is saved after pressing **CAPTURE DATA FRAME**.

It should be noted that the file is only regenerated after pressing SELECT RECORD FILE.

In any other case, the data is simply appended to the file displayed in the file path.

Even if the software has been restarted.

PRINTOUT LINE1 is stored in the file.

Pressing PRINT DOCUMENTATION DATA will output the current color coordinates, their **delta** values and the two text lines **PRINTOUT LINE1** and **PRINTOUT LINE2** to a printer. The button **FILL LINE2 WITH DATE** is used to enter the current date and time into **PRINTOUT LINE2**.

The data can also be output to a label printer. Please note that the labels must be at least 50mm in width and 30mm in heigth.

If the labels are not output correctly, this can be optimized in the settings of the respective printer(printer-dependent).






3.1 Loading the roll adhesive label and the thermal transfer ribbon

3.1.1 Loading media from roll



- 1. Turn ring (2) at the margin stop (1) counterclockwise, so that the arrow points to the symbol •., and thus release the margin stop.
- 2. Remove the margin stop (1) from the roll retainer (4).
- 3. Load label roll (3) on the roll retainer (4) in such a way that the labels can be inserted into the printhead in the right position. The printing side of the labels must be visible from above.
- 4. Re-mount the margin stop (1) onto the roll retainer (4). Push the margin stop (1) to the roll (3) until the roll touches both margin stops and a clear resistance is encountered.
- 6. Turn lever (8) counterclockwise to open printhead.
- 7. Position guides (5) by turning the knob (7) so that they are several millimeters wider than the material.
- 8. Position material below the roller (6) and guide it through the print unit.

Attention! Guide material through the print unit below the label sensor (9).

- 9. Move guides (5) closely to the edges of the material without clamping the material.
- 10. Adjust label sensor (see next page)
- 11. Press printhead retainer down and turn lever (8) clockwise to lock the printhead.



Adjusting the label sensor


Note!

When the printer is delivered the label sensor is positioned in the middle of the paper feed.

Thus, the label sensor must only be adjusted if materials with the following characteristics are used:

- Material with reflex or cut-out marks, which are not in the middle.
- Multi-strip material with an even number of strips.
- Material with irregularly shaped labels.

If the labels recommended by us are used, an adjustment is not necessary.





The sensor position (3) is marked with a yellow LED in the sensor retainer.

- 1. Open the printhead.
- 2. Bring knob (3) by pressing it into the setting position (3b).
- 3. Position the sensor holder (1) by turning the knob (3) so that the sensor (2) can detect the front edge of the label in the direction of paper flow or the reflex or cut-out mark.
- 4. Bring knob (3) by pressing it into the basic position (3a).



3.1.2 Loading transfer ribbon





- Clean the printhead before loading the transfer ribbon (see Operator's Manual EOS2, ▷ 6.3 on page 18).
- 2. Open the printhead.
- 3. Set guide (1) on the ribbon supply hub to the correct transfer ribbon width (Figure left):
 - Hold the hub and unlock the guide (1) by turning it in direction A..
 - Slide the guide (1) in direction B and adjust the guide to the ribbon width using the scale.
 - Hold the hub and lock the guide (1) by turning it in direction C.
- Slide transfer ribbon roll (5) onto the ribbon supply hub (3) until it reaches the guide (1) so that the color coating of the ribbon faces downward when being unwound.

Note!


To rewind the ribbon a ribbon core (4) is needed that must be at least equal in width to the supply ribbon. When changing the transfer ribbon use the empty supply ribbon core for winding the next ribbon.

- 5. Adjust the position of the guide on the take-up hub to the width of the ribbon core (4) and push ribbon core on the take-up hub (2).
- 6. Guide the transfer ribbon though the printing unit as shown in Figure below.

ATTENTION!

Guide transfer ribbon over the label sensor (6).

- 7. Secure starting end of transfer ribbon to the transfer ribbon core (4) with adhesive tape. Regard counterclockwise rotation direction of the transfer ribbon take-up hub here.
- 8. Turn transfer ribbon take-up hub (2) counterclockwise to smooth out the feed path of the transfer ribbon.
- 9. Close the printhead.





3.2 Installing the printer driver for Windows via USB cable

The following describes how to install the driver for the EOS2 label printer under Windows via the USB interface. See also PDF file "Configuration manual cab Label Printers" under the following link: https://www.cab.de/en/marking/label-printer/eos25/#dokumentation

- 1. Make sure that the label printer is switched off.
- 2. Exit all running programs
- 3. Connect the printer to the power supply and connect the A-B cable to your computer.

ATTENTION!

Do not yet switch on the printer!

4. First download the printer driver "cab Windows Driver" to the hard disk of your PC.




The driver is then either in the download folder or in the path you may have selected. Unzip the "cab Windows Driver.zip" file.

- 5. Now turn on the printer. The Windows installation wizard is started automatically.
- 6. Start the application "PrnInst" and follow the instructions on the screen. After successful installation, an icon for the label printer appears in the Windows system folder "Printers".





The USB interface may have to be briefly disconnected and then reconnected.






If the printer was recognized, you can still make printer settings here. However, this is normally not necessary. Press \rightarrow Install.



If the installation was successful, the following window appears. Now press \rightarrow Exit.






3.3 Setting the printer properties

After the printer has been installed, it is displayed in the Windows system folder "Printers".



Press \rightarrow Manage and then \rightarrow Printer settings. For \rightarrow Size, set 50.00 for Width and 30.00 for Height. This is the label size. Confirm with \rightarrow Apply and \rightarrow OK.








Now start the **SPECTRO3-MSM-DOCAL-Scope** and establish the connection to the sensor. In the **DOCU** tab, some data records can now be recorded. The **PRINTOUT LINE** fields can also be written.



Then press → PRINT DOCUMENTATION DATA.
Select the label printer "CAB EOS2/300" and confirm with OK.





A successful printout looks like this:
